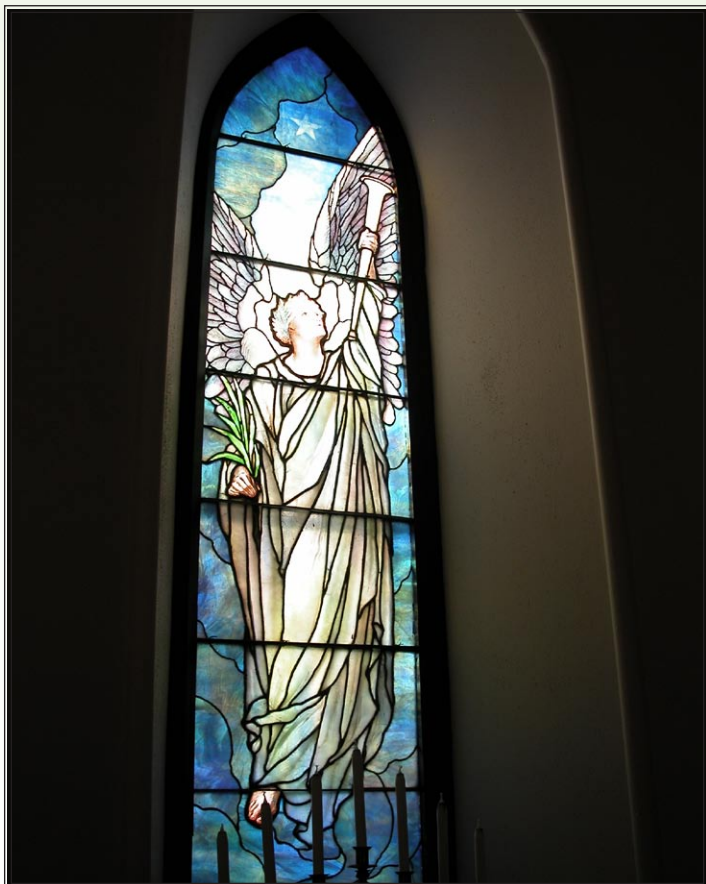

# Glass glitters with history



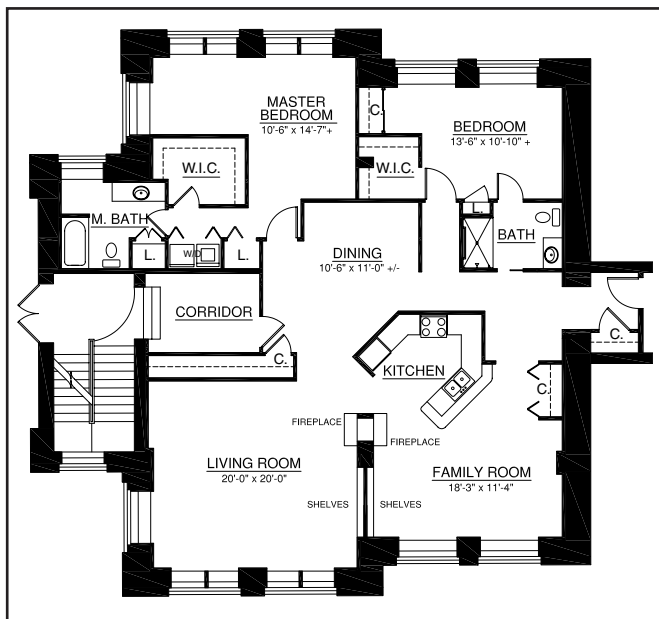

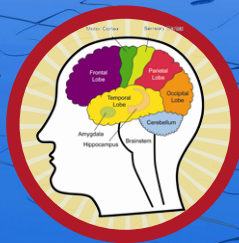
